1 in 100 U.S. adults is incarcerated. Half of incarcerated men and women have not graduated high school. Ninety-five percent will be released. Within five years, approximately 75% will recidivate (re-offend and return to prison after release): <a href="https://www.nij.gov/topics/corrections/recidivism/Pages/welcome.aspx">https://www.nij.gov/topics/corrections/recidivism/Pages/welcome.aspx</a>).

Research repeatedly reveals that prisoners who participate in educational programs behind bars are up to 40% less likely to recidivate than prisoners who receive no education. For those few who are able to receive a whole bachelor's degree behind bars, recidivism drops to as low as 4%. Educating is far cheaper than incarcerating and gives hope, prevents unnecessary suffering, and enhances life by addressing the innate human desire to learn and grow that should be supported for everyone.

Quadrupling since 1980, mass incarceration has reached national crisis proportions, resulting in beaucoup wasted taxpayer dollars and, far worse, wasted lives, disrupted families, and decimated communities. You can help fix that.

- <u>Adult Facilities</u>. Interns will teach once weekly during Fall and/or Spring semesters during the C session, typically Friday mornings and typically in pairs—at the Eyman (men), Florence (men), Perryville (women), or Phoenix (men) State Prison Complexes or at the Salt River Pima-Maricopa Indian Community Arizona Department of Corrections in Scottsdale (men, women, youth)—delivering college level instruction in a subject of their choice as approved by prison administration. Most classes at the men's facilities occur on Friday mornings. Classes at the women's and youth facilities are also taught on other days but typically on morning schedules.
- <u>Juvenile Facility</u>. Interns at Adobe Mountain School will typically teach twice per week during the A or B session, as negotiated.
- Teachers must have a mode of transportation to and from the prison or youth facility and be eligible for Arizona Department of Corrections or Juvenile Corrections clearance (essentially have no jail or prison record and no medical marijuana use within the last year). Many ASU teachers and interns carpool. (The drive from Tempe to the Eyman and Florence locations is about 75 minutes; to Perryville, 45 to 75 minutes, depending on road construction and traffic; to Adobe Mountain, 45 to 60 minutes, to Phoenix and Scottsdale, depends on traffic.) Prison teaching experience not only provides a much needed humanitarian service to an educationally underprivileged group, but also adds to a compelling resume.
- Many volunteer teachers teach in pairs.

CLEARANCE, TRAINING, & AVAILABILITY		
Prior to teaching, all interns are required to (1) obtain official clearance from the Arizona Department of Corrections (ADC) or the Arizona Department of Juvenile Corrections (ADJC) (2) attend a one-half to one-day FACE-TO-FACE training session conducted by ADC or ADJC or Salt River. Clearance at ADC requires drug and TB testing, fingerprinting, and several hours of online training. ADC FACE-TO-FACE training usually occurs on the first Friday of the semester. The ADJC FACE-TO-FACE training will be negotiated with admin at Adobe Mountain. Please initial here to indicate that you will attend this mandatory event:  Note: Clearance badges at the adult prisons typically take 4-6 weeks. Clearance badges at the youth facility take 3-6 weeks.
